Application	<p>This unit of competency covers the skills and knowledge required to interpret and apply knowledge of equine behaviour, cognition and learning to ensure that the behavioural needs and welfare of horses are met while maintaining a safe working environment. It covers all breeds and intended uses and environments. The unit focuses on horses and can be applied to other domestic equids.</p> <p>The unit applies to individuals who have an independent or management role working with horses, and require a detailed understanding of equine behaviour to make decisions and communicate solutions for welfare, care, handling, education and management.</p> <p>Commonwealth and state/territory health and safety, and animal welfare legislation, regulations and codes of practice relevant to interacting with horses apply to workers in this industry. Requirements vary between industry sectors and jurisdictions.</p> <p>No licensing or certification requirements apply to this unit at the time of publication.</p>

TITLE	Assessment requirements for ACMEQU4X12 Interpret and address equine behaviour and welfare
Performance Evidence	
<p>An individual demonstrating competency must satisfy all of the elements and performance criteria in this unit.</p> <p>There must be evidence that the individual has:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • prepared an ethogram, including facial language for a ridden or sport/performance horse • developed and documented a behaviour management plan for two horses displaying different behavioural issues using current, evidence-based techniques • assessed the welfare of the two horses above using a recognised animal welfare assessment framework tool • communicated information about the behaviour and welfare of the two horses above to a handler or client • reviewed and evaluated workplace or practitioner practices and updated at least two procedures to incorporate knowledge of equine behaviour and welfare <p>Original PE</p> <p>There must be evidence that the individual has:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • researched and collated a portfolio of information on the key features of equine ethology, behaviour and welfare relevant to work operations • accurately interpreted equine behaviour, including body language, vocalisation, locomotory behaviour and interactions with other horses, on at least five occasions • investigated approaches used at three horse facilities, including management routines used for similar purposes, to identify good practices and/or recommend changes to improve the wellbeing and behaviour of horses in each facility • communicated information about the individual behaviour and welfare of two horses to workers and/or clients relevant to work operations. 	

Knowledge Evidence	
<p>An individual must be able to demonstrate the knowledge required to perform the tasks outlined in the elements and performance criteria of this unit. This includes knowledge of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • behavioural needs and patterns of domestic horses, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • handled and unhandled horses • herd behaviour • individual stabled or yarded horses • equine behaviour, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • body language and vocalisations • evolutionary basis of horse behaviour and its impact on the behavioural needs of horses • affective/emotional states, including fear, anxiety, hunger, fatigue • behaviours and conditions typically linked to strong fight or flight response • high-risk behaviours (biting, kicking, panicking, extreme flight response) • concept and formats for documenting an ethogram • key features of current research in equine, ethology/behaviour, cognition and learning • key animal welfare frameworks and application to horses, including, Five Freedoms, Five Domains Model, or quality of life indicators • application of research to the management, handling, housing and education of horses • identification of situations requiring specialist advice on equine behaviour • effect of the environment, housing, handling, education and management decisions on the behaviour and welfare of horses • regulatory requirements and organisational policies and procedures relevant to equine behaviour, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • work health and safety • animal welfare • local government regulations. 	

Assessment Conditions

Assessment of the skills in this unit of competency must take place under the following conditions:

- physical conditions:
 - an equine workplace or an environment that accurately represents workplace conditions
- resources, equipment and materials:
 - live horses and video scenarios of live horses to observe a range of equine behaviours
 - technology to access information, and/or sources of current information on equine behaviour and welfare.

Training and assessment strategies must show evidence of the use of guidance provided in the *Companion Volume: User Guide: Safety in Equine Training*.

Assessors of this unit must satisfy the requirements for assessors in applicable vocational education and training legislation, frameworks and/or standards.
